The Worship Committee has been working on the continued transition back to a more normal pattern of worship following the impact of Covid on our gatherings.

A variety of preferences for summer worship venue have been communicated to the committee, slightly modifying earlier plans. In response to feedback, the basic structure of worship this summer now generally looks like: June (Church House), July (Sanctuary), and August (Outdoor).

We will not gather for in-person worship on Sunday, July 4, but will return to worship in the sanctuary on Sunday, July 11. Included in that and subsequent services will be congregational hymns. We will remain in the Sanctuary for worship on Sundays, July 11, 18 and 25.

We will move to outdoor worship on the church lawn in August. Outdoor worship will take place Sundays, August 1, 8, 22, and 29. On August 15, we will have a special guest speaker, Lisa A., the executive presbyter of Cincinnati Presbytery and anticipate moving into the Sanctuary for that service.

Outdoor worship will conclude on Sunday, September 5.

We will return to regular worship on Sunday, September 12 at 10:30AM. The Annual Congregational Meeting will follow worship on that date.

Christopher Klein in an article titled, *When Teddy Roosevelt Was Shot in 1912, a Speech May Have Saved His Life*: "Theodore Roosevelt's opening line was hardly remarkable for a presidential campaign speech: 'Friends, I shall ask you to be as quiet as possible.' His second line, however, was a bombshell.

'I don't know whether you fully understand that I have just been shot. ...'

The horrified audience in the Milwaukee Auditorium on October 14, 1912, gasped as the former president unbuttoned his vest to reveal his bloodstained shirt. 'It takes more than that to kill a bull moose,' the

wounded candidate assured them. He reached into his coat pocket and pulled out a bulletriddled, 50-page speech. Holding up his prepared remarks, which had two big holes blown through each page, Roosevelt continued. 'Fortunately I had my manuscript, so you see I was going to make a long speech, and there is a bullet – there is where the bullet went through – and it probably saved me from it going into my heart. The bullet is in me now, so that I cannot make a very long speech, but I will try my best. ...'

X-rays taken after the campaign event showed the bullet lodged against Roosevelt's fourth right rib on an upward path to his heart. Fortunately, the projectile had been slowed by his dense overcoat, steel-reinforced eyeglass case and hefty speech squeezed into his inner right jacket pocket."

The story of Teddy Roosevelt delivering a political speech with a bullet newly lodged in his chest has passed into history as an illustration of his stamina determination, and perseverance.

As such, it serves as an example to those Americans who come after him who might be inclined to emulate those same virtues.

The Bible points us to a doctrine of perseverance. Apart from God's saving love in Christ, we are estranged and alienated from God by sin. After we come to saving faith, the New

> Testament's call is to pursue holiness, practice good works, and cultivate a variety of virtues.

The scriptures tell us that, in spite of our best efforts, human beings can neither initiate nor maintain a saving relationship with God. Salvation comes from outside of us as God's unilateral action.

We are kept in right relationship with God by the Holy Spirit. God gives us the gift of faith, enlivens our will, and enables us to turn to Him in repentance, trusting in Christ for salvation. The Holy Spirit perseveres with the believer who can never finally fall or turn away from God. Reformed theology describes this idea as the perseverance of the saints.

Jesus offers assurance and comfort to God's people: "My sheep hear my voice, and I shall know them, and they follow me; and I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish, and no one shall snatch them out of my hand." (John 10:27-28)

Paul wrote about the perseverance of the believer: *"For I am sure that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."* (Romans 8:38-39)

The little epistle of Jude exults in God's faithfulness to keep and preserve God's people: *"Now to him who is able to keep you from falling and* to present you without blemish before the presence of his glory with rejoicing, to the only God, our Savior through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, dominion, and authority, before all time and now and forever. Amen." (Jude 24,25)

God is faithful in keeping us in right relationship to Him. Nothing and no one can cut us off from God's love, even our own bent toward sin, our wandering, and our unbelief.

"And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, in whom you were sealed for the day of redemption."

(Ephesians 4:30)

Teddy Roosevelt's oversized speech saved his life. His determination to deliver the speech even after being shot is surely an example of perseverance for the ages. As Christians, we are saved by the cross and resurrection of Christ and are then called to a life of faithfulness. But, when we stumble or are less than faithful, when we are unable to persevere in faith and holiness, God's love perseveres with us through every circumstance to bring us safely home to God's love.

Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing communicates this happy assurance with the words:

Oh, to grace how great a debtor, Daily I'm constrained to be, Let that goodness like a fetter; Bind my wandering heart to Thee. Prone to wander, Lord I feel it; Prone to leave the God I love, Here's my heart, oh, take and seal it Seal it for Thy courts above.

As it does this year, July 4 fell on Sunday in 1937. While Pastor Eldred Johnston led worship that morning in Paulding, Ohio, local kids set off firecrackers nearby (restrictions were rare back then). Realizing he needed to act, the pastor slipped outside during a hymn and found the revelers.

But instead of scolding or shouting, Johnston stayed calm. "I used to enjoy shooting fireworks too," he said, adding that he knew it was a fun way to celebrate. "But many in this town are gathered in worship, and the noise is very distracting. All I'm asking is that you wait until church services are over — about noon — and then shoot firecrackers all you want." The pastor smiled at each youth and returned to church.

Recounting that experience in *Liberty* magazine, Johnston said he halfexpected to hear defiant explosions. Instead, the kids waited respectfully until worship was over. When conflicts loom, may we heed that example – and this advice from Proverbs: "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (15:1, NIV).
