From the Pastor's Desk

Paul reiterates that theme of Christian liberty regarding a Sabbath day in Romans 14:5-6a and Galatians 4:9-10.

occasions to gather with family or friends for an outdoor picnic or vacation getaway.

Considering the idea of Sabbath, in Genesis 2:3 we find God modeling a day of rest for humanity on the seventh day after six days of creative work.

Later, on Mount Sinai, God's people are given the law of Moses in the Ten Commandments, and are enjoined to observe a day of sabbath rest (Exodus 20:11).

The resurrection of Jesus occurred on the first day of the week. The earliest Jewish believers in Jesus, seem to quickly have transitioned from a Saturday Sabbath to gather instead for worship on Sunday, the day of resurrection.

Acts 20:7 records: "Now on the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread ..."

Though the primitive church observed Sunday as a day of worship, Paul understood the Sabbath, as a religious obligation, as having been fulfilled by Christ. After Christ, observance of holy days and a Sabbath is a matter of conscience, not obligation.

Writing in Colossians 2:16,17, Paul exhorts: "So let no one judge you in food or in drink, or regarding a festival or a new moon or sabbaths, which are a shadow of things to come, but the substance is of Christ."

For the earliest Christians, the Sabbath was a part of the law of Moses which anticipated the work of Christ. After Christ, Sabbath oserservance was understood as a ceremonial part of the law which was fulfilled and no longer binding on the believer.

The essence of Sabbath observance after the first coming of Christ is its signal of freedom and grace. All of life has been 'sabbathed' by Christ for us (Hebrews 3 and 4). We can rest from efforts to justify ourselves and instead rest in the grace and love of God which claims us where we are at and takes us to where God wants us to be.

Understood in that way, observing the Lord's Day by gathering at church, and being deliberate about setting aside usual obligations and busy-ness, can become an opportunity to catch your breath, refocus on what's important, and cultivate being, and not just doing.

God's saving love has claimed us in Christ, and so Sunday, as the Lord's Day, is neither a dour obligation nor merely ritual observance, but rather an opportunity for joyful worship with other believers, and enjoyment of family, friends, and the world around us. That understanding of Sabbath can inform the way we view the slower days of summer, Sundays, and every day, as the gifts of a gracious God.

# A matter of perspective

Pastor and author T.D. Jakes tells of visiting a community in Africa where a woman from the local church welcomed him into her small home. Proud to have built the structure herself, she swept her arm toward the door — a blanket — as if inviting him into a mansion. She offered him a seat — on her bed — and graciously served a meal. As Jakes departed in a small plane, rain began falling. The pastor looked down to see his host dancing in gratitude.

He was struck by the contrast between his African host and many Americans, including himself. How often we let worries about our "small" house, lack of nice furniture or inability to serve gourmet food get in the way of welcoming friends or new acquaintances into our home. How often we view rain as an annoyance, complicating our day and depressing our mood. Meanwhile, this woman was eager to share her humble house and grateful for God's gift of moisture in her dry homeland.
