

From the Minister's Desk

The Apostle Paul writes to the church in Ephesus: "Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever." Ephesians 3:20,21

We might find it difficult to create time for extended prayer and meditation, or Bible study surrounded as we are by so many distractions and competitors for our time. Sitting down with a substantial book on Christian theology or another weighty topic might jostle with the myriad of other demands on our attention. Responding as fully as we would like to every circumstance we come across of someone in need of our help can be overwhelming.

One message I hear in this passage is that God is able to work in our lives, in that which we are able to do, and multiply or expand our efforts.

2 Corinthians 12:9 finds Paul reflecting on his own struggles: "But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me."

We are not able to accomplish it all. We can and do find ourselves not infrequently tired, our efforts diffused; distracted by everything we would aspire to be and do. It is in those moments that we can rest in God's strength and trust that He will work through us to accomplish His wise purposes.

God *is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think.* What Paul may be getting at in Ephesians 3 is just that God works in our lives beyond the limits of our imagination, vision, or strength. The passages in Ephesians 3 and 2 Corinthians 12 are jointly a summons to our best efforts at the Christian life, and a hearty trust that God's love and power will sustain us and bring to fulfillment all that we aim to accomplish for Him.

Our congregation is gathering each Sunday for an abbreviated, thirty-minute service despite the current surge in local Omicron cases. We are adhering to our guidelines of masks, spaced apart seating, and shutting off the heat circulation prior to our services. Certainly, there is a collective weariness of these protocols, but with that comes a stronger conviction that with spring a loosening of these restrictions will be both welcome and appropriate! The sacrament of communion is reliably celebrated on the first Sunday of each month.

Author Leo Buscaglia, who became known as "Dr. Love" for writing about the topic, said, "Too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around.".
