services earlier to the colonial era. Churches were often the hub of both religious and community life. In a nation characterized by frequent relocations westward to the expanding frontier, occasions of homecoming developed to provide an opportunity for those who had moved away to reconnect with family and friends.

Whatever the precise origins of homecoming services, today they frequently are held in September or October, but might occur anytime from June to November.

Regardless of when a homecoming takes place, or what features on the menu, its fundamental components are worship and fellowship. Homecoming is a celebration that our 'lines have fallen in pleasant places,' that we have a 'good inheritance.' The First Presbyterian Church *of* Glendale will hold a homecoming service on Sunday, October 9. Bruce and Beth Archibald will be attending the event. The Rev. Dr. Archibald, HR will participate in the worship service. Following worship, a pig roast lunch catered by Vonderhaar's will be provided.

You will soon receive a reminder in the mail to 'save the date.' An invitation and response card will arrive shortly thereafter. It will be important to return your **RSVP** (for lunch only) to the church office no later than August 9 as seating is limited and to allow an accurate count for the lunch.

Homecoming this October will be a good opportunity to showcase our church, and reconnect with fellow church members, family, and friends as we offer our thanks to God in worship for our church, one another, and all of life's blessings.

God among the rubble

The nonprofit World Central Kitchen (WCK) provides fresh meals for communities in need following natural disasters or during humanitarian crises. After Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, WCK fed millions of people in the country and refugees at border crossings.

When I feel discouraged by tragic news and ask where God is, I'm reminded that God shows up precisely in people such as the WCK teams. They are God's hands serving healthy food to people fleeing home. They are God's heart and arms welcoming those in need to be nourished.

Often in the Bible, God shows up around meals: Sarah and Abraham host the Lord in the form of

three visitors; God rains manna from heaven for the Israelites; an angel provides food for exhausted Elijah; Jesus eats with "tax collectors and sinners" and feeds crowds with a few loaves and fish. Supremely, Jesus give to all the meal of Holy Communion, the bread and wine that are his very body and blood.

In our broken world, God is among the rubble, among the helpers, among us.
