## HMessage from our Minister



There is a story about a man who purchased a donkey from a preacher. 'The preacher told the man that this donkey had been trained in a very unique way (being the donkey of a preacher). The only way to make the donkey go was to say, "Hallelujah!" The only way to make the donkey stop was to say, "Amen!"

The man was pleased with his purchase and immediately got on the animal to try out the preacher's instructions. "Hallelujah!" shouted the man. The donkey began to trot. "Amen!" shouted the man. The donkey stopped immediately. "This is great!" said the man. With a "Hallelujah," he rode off, very proud of his new purchase.

The man traveled for a long time through some mountains. Soon he was heading toward a cliff. He could not remember the word to make the donkey stop. "Stop," said the man. "Halt!" he cried. The donkey just kept going. "Oh, no ... Bible! ... Church! ... Please Stop!!" shouted the man. The donkey just began to trot faster. He was getting closer and closer to the cliff edge. Finally, in desperation, the man said a prayer. "Please, dear Lord. Please make this donkey stop before I go off the end of this mountain, In Jesus' name, AMEN." The donkey came to an abrupt stop just one step from the edge of the cliff.

#### "HALLELUJAH!" shouted the man.'

The scriptures tell us that Jesus entered the city of Jerusalem on Palm Sunday riding on a donkey. Pious legend relates that Mary, close to giving birth to Jesus, made her way to Bethlehem with her husband Joseph astride a donkey. Whether or not Mary was conveyed by donkey to Bethlehem to give birth to Jesus, his life from birth to death was typified by humility.

A key component of the Christmas Story is that of the Divine condescension. The Son of God, the eternal Word, arrives on the stage of human history not with pomp and circumstance, but in humility.

God in Christ enters our experience with the purpose of redeeming human beings and setting right what had gone wrong in Adam's sin. He does so not as one born to wealth or political standing, but rather the son of peasant parents, his father a laborer, a simple artisan, a carpenter. The home in which he grew up was situated in a nation under occupation by the Roman Empire.

Luther describes the humble circumstances surrounding the birth of Jesus: "If Christ had entered in splendor like a king of earth, the appearance and the words would have been according to nature and reason and would have seemed to the eye according to the words, but then there would have been no room for faith. He who believes in Christ must find riches in poverty, honor in dishonor, joy in sorrow, life in death, and hold fast to them in that faith which clings to the Word and expects such things." <sup>2</sup>

The Apostle Paul in Philippians 2:7 describes the life of Jesus by saying: '(He) emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men.'

In 2 Corinthians 8:9 we read: 'For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you through His poverty might become rich.'

Hebrews 4:15 describes the purpose of Christ's humility: 'For we do not have a high priest who

Rather, the eternal Son of God enters human history and our experience to show us the heart of God, to illustrate God's love for us, and God's intention for human life. May we find cause to rejoice in

the Christmas story this Advent season and in the coming new year.

what I think thou art but to what thou knowest thyself to be,' our situation is . . . desperate." And so C.S. Lewis launches us into a collection of devilish letters from Uncle Screwtape to his 'nephew' Wormwood in his classic and widely popular, *The Screwtape Letters*.

Lewis wrote about the inspiration for the book in a letter to his brother who had recently been rescued from nazi-surrounded Dunkirk during WWII. Lewis explained that in church on July 21, 1940 - the morning after he had listened to a very persuasive radio speech by Hitler that made even Lewis waiver in his convictions - he had been "struck by an idea for a book which I think might be both useful and entertaining. It would be called *As One Devil to Another*... the idea would be to give all the psychology of temptation from the other point of view."

As much as *The Screwtape Letters* did indeed prove to be very 'useful' to thousands during the confusion of WWII, it is a book equally valuable for us in today's culture of rapid change and confusion. Recognizing an enemy of truth and the Christian faith in the complex world around us is challenging, yet recognizing

the subtle, shadowy whispers and twists of an enemy within is often even more difficult. But before there can be hope of progress in dealing with any enemy, the enemy must first be recognizable. Therefore any assistance and wisdom in this recognition is genuinely welcomed. And this is what Alan Vermilye has done with his study of Lewis's *The Screwtape Letters*.

Vermilye walks the reader through each Screwtape letter and wisely asks questions to bring out turns and twists in the thoughts and emotions we each experience and that Lewis wanted us to recognize. He helps us to see where crippling 'truths' are often nothing more than half-truths and lies that enslave us with pride and defensiveness or shame and reticence.

From his years of teaching Bible study classes, Vermilye also smartly adds Scripture to weigh in on the discussion. For anyone or group that wants to become more intimate with God by reassessing some of the enemy's strongholds within, I highly recommend Alan Vermiley's study.

This is a time of year when we ask—and are asked—what do you want? Shall it be another tie, a new pair of gloves, a book? We ask and we answer. We shop, we wrap, we ship. And the season usually comes and goes without us ever really answering the question: What do you want?

Some of the things we want we might be afraid to ask for because we can't be sure what we would do if we got them. Many things we want we don't know enough to ask for. Most things we can't ask for because we know no one can give them to us.

Most people ask the question without any interest in really knowing, yet is can be a question for each of us to hold on to for a time in mind and heart. What do we want? Not what would we like, but what do we want to give us a deeper connection with life and to help us give expression to our love? Not a long list of things, but a sense of clarity that illuminates what it is we are doing and why. Not outward signs of generosity, but an internal sense of caring that guides us to give in any season. Not just the reflex of always giving, but also the courage to truly answer some of those people who ask us, 'What do you want'?


