From the Minister's Desk,

The Old Testament story of the exodus of the Hebrews from Egypt points us to God's intention to free people from bondage. In the case of the Hebrews, it was freedom from literal bondage as slaves. In the New Testament, it becomes clear that the real bondage that human beings experience is enslavement to sin. Later, in the New Testament, Jesus is the one who supersedes Moses. Jesus is the savior who gives his life to liberate all people everywhere from bondage to sin and death.

One lesson to be learned during the exodus by the Hebrews, amid their struggles and complaints, was that God would provide. God delivered the people at the crossing of the Red Sea, led the people by day and night, gave the law to Moses, and gifted the people provisions and food for the forty-year journey to the promised land. As a part of the law, the people were to observe one day in seven as a Sabbath. This Sabbath had the effect of teaching the people that God would provide. There would be enough. There was time to rest. God was with and for them.

In the same way, even now God provides what we need for our journey of faith. Jesus has sabbathed all of life. We do not work for or merit our salvation. It is a gift of God. We are to rest from vain efforts to justify ourselves, and instead rest in God's free grace and love. Like the Hebrews, we can also rest from the subtle tyranny of the everyday to-do's and checklists that seem to run our lives. We can trust that there is enough, including enough time. Scripture tells us that God will provide and be with us and for us on the journey.

Allen Pruitt, writing in Day1.org in an article titled 'There Is Enough' comes at these

ideas this way: "Ever heard of anyone who's a slave to their stuff, to their bills? Do you know anybody who is a slave to security, to feeling safe? They tend to take it out on the people around them, don't they?

And these Israelites were rescued from all that by a God who commanded them to rest. Rescued from all that by a God who knew that Sabbath is the only means of satisfaction. Because God made the world with nothing, and so nothing could ever really be a threat. If nothing, just a black and empty void, was plenty to make all that is, then there is enough. All around us there is enough.

But that's not how we work, is it? That's not how we're built. For us, there is never enough. And so, we complain. 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water. And we detest this miserable food.'...

The story is the same, from beginning to end. Manna falls from heaven, and it isn't enough. There is no food; it is detestable food; it isn't enough. The whole blessed garden, save that one tree there in the middle. It isn't enough. What will be enough? ...

One-liners about God are rarely any good, but one of my favorites comes from Walter Brueggemann: 'God is not useful.' God will not be used, not by those seeking their best life now, not by those who pretend that judgment is the end and not mercy. God will just show up, often uninvited, ready ... or not."

The summer slowdown at FPCG, when there may not be quite as much hustle and bustle at church as during other seasons, is an appropriate time to remind ourselves of the gift of Sabbath rest. We can trust that God is with us. God provides what we need. With God, there is always enough.

Thanks to Matt for painting the wooden steps at the rear kitchen entrance with antislip paint.



You are in good hands with Carolyn. Remember that she is human and will make mistakes. She may change the look of some things, but that doesn't make them wrong; just different. Please give her the same safe space to grow in this job as you gave me.

You offered me a safe space to heal and serve God and His children. For that I will be forever grateful! Thank you. I will miss all of you more than you will ever know! You will remain forever in my prayers ...debbie
